



Region was trying to come to terms with closure of cattle markets

Memissing the year 2019 and 2026 evokes a bitter taste for Martina Nakidon, a resident of Kalokarutkot village in Kapeta sub-county Korklo district.

Nakidon namated trying moments she and her colleagues in Karamoja bave enduned since hale 2019

She explained that the region depends on livestock as source of food and income. However, in July 2019, the region was hit he foce and mouth disease (FMD), which prompted the Government to close all the livestock markets.

"We depend on livestock but foot and mouth disease led to the closure of our markets. This affected our income and threatened our food security. she said.

COVID-19 PANDENIC

As the region was trying to come to terms with the closure of markets, the country was hit by the coronavirus in March.

Anna Ctilla, the chairperson Kokoria Women's Group, said the closure of markets and the COVID-19 lockdown members' savines affected as they had nowhere to get money to save as well as lend to members.

Ciilla said the group has 30 members and used to save sh450,000 per week, but sh450,000 per week, but following the hardships, they only save sh20,000.

The group is unable to lend money to its members because we depend on weekly savings to deburse loans," she said.

Ciilla said COVID-19 has also affected the group's social lives since they can no longer freely meet to discuss matters related to development.

"We cannot even visit our friends when they are unwell because of the COVID-19 restrictions," she said.

Ciilla said they also used to sensitise people on the education of eirls but they can no longer do so.

In our sub-county alone about 100 girls have been impregnated during the lockdown and cases gender-based violence have increased," she said.

"In our culture, it is women who take care of the families. so they are struggling to do so as men blame them for not doing enough to feed the families," Cilla said.

She said maternal health has been affected as many mothers cannot go for antenatal visits because they cannot walk long distances to hospitals.
